

# Newsletter April 2019

Kenya, officially the Republic of Kenya (Swahili: Jamhuri ya Kenya), is a country in Africa with 47 semi autonomous counties governed by elected governors. At 580,367 square kilometres (224,081 sq mi), Kenya is the world's 48th largest country by total area. With a population of more than 52.2 million people, Kenya is the 27th most populous country. Kenya's capital and largest city is Nairobi while its oldest city and first capital is the coastal city of Mombasa. Kisumu City is the third largest city and a critical inland port at Lake Victoria. Other important urban centres include Nakuru and Eldoret.



Mombasa is a coastal city of Kenya along the Indian Ocean. It is the country's oldest (circa 900 AD) and second-largest city (after the capital Nairobi), with an estimated population of about 1.5 million people in 2017. Its metropolitan region is the second largest in the country and has a population of approximately 3 million people. Administratively, Mombasa is the county seat of Mombasa County.

Mombasa is a regional cultural and economic hub; it has an extra-large port and an international airport, and is an important regional tourism centre. Located on the east coast of Kenya, it also is the home of one of the State House (Kenya), and is considered by some as a second capital in all but name. In Mombasa County and the former Coast Province, Mombasa's situation on the Indian Ocean made it a historical trading centre and it has been controlled by many countries because of its strategic location.

Educaid Africa supports schools and pupils in the Mombasa region.

### Saint Luke's Day

St. Luke's day in Kaloleni is a day when the Church focuses on the sick and less fortunate in the community. At St. Luke's hospital, the day provides free medical services for many patients both adults and children. Last year 334 attended St Luke's Day. In addition, 38 children were screened for malnutrition. In his report the hospital clinical officer said, "I wish to sincerely thank and appreciate Educaid Africa for their sustained support of medicines which
